- The Malone University Social Work major meets all state licensing requirements, and prepares graduates to take the Licensed Social Worker (LSW) credential exam.

- Students can plan to do their Senior Field requirement (SWK440, SWK460) over two consecutive semesters if advised before entering into practicum.
