- Incoming students with an ACT math score > 24 (SAT math > 580) are exempt from MATH/PSYC 140 unless the course is required in their programs of study.
- MATH/PSYC 140 can be satisfied by taking BUS 240-Statistics for Business or MATH 150 - Precalculus if required by a major/minor program of study.
