Greetings,

On behalf of my History, Philosophy, and Social Sciences colleagues, greetings. I think I can safely say that all students and faculty at Malone are relieved that this pandemic-restricted school year is finished and that we look forward to improving conditions.

This year has contained many challenges, but also joys. While in the Fall we juggled inperson, remote, and asynchronous teaching modalities simultaneously, in the Spring we

shifted to just in-person and synchronous remote instruction and some easing of restrictions as the semester progressed. After cancelling last year's Woolman Lectures in Christian Scholarship, we were able to host Prof. David Walsh of the Catholic University of America this Spring for two lectures on personhood, dignity, and rights. Scholarships were also granted this evening. Dr. Stuckey was a Professor of History and Sociology at Malone from 1969 to 1999, served as department chair for seventeen years, and continued as an HPSS an adjunct until 2002. Since 2006, when Britt Railing Steiner '08 received the first Stuckey scholarship, the department has awarded nearly thirty non-renewable scholarships to history, Integrated Social Studies, and political science majors. (Students may reapply yearly.) The names of this year's recipients, **Kayley Lucyzwo '23** and **Samantha "Sammi" Krocker '24**, will be added to the Stuckey Scholarship plaque.
